

LESSONS FROM THE FOUR LITTLE CREATURES

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Knowledge they say is power; but it is the application of knowledge that produces result and changes things. There are many ways of acquiring knowledge: Reading of books, receiving teaching and instruction from a knowledgeable person in a particular field, by observation of people, events and creatures, and by experience of life. Observing the creation of God brings us great knowledge and wisdom. Agur son of Jakeh of Israel discovered this to be a wonderful way of learning and becoming great and successful in life. He took time to study his environment and the things that fascinate him. He discovered four little creatures that achieved great things by his own calculation, and he wrote it down for us to read.

I wanted to know what he discovered about these four little creatures that he declared to be very wise, so I took a closer look at these creatures of our great God, and I discovered great deposits of wisdom in their thinking and way of life. I hope you will find my discoveries interesting and enlightening.

Prov 30:24-28

24 "Four things on earth are small, yet they are extremely wise: 25 Ants are creatures of little strength, yet they store up their food in the summer; 26 coney are creatures of little power, yet they make their home in the crags; 27 locusts have no king, yet they advance together in ranks; 28 a lizard can be caught with the hand, yet it is found in kings' palaces.

All these four little creatures are small in size but great in thoughts. What they lack in physical strength, they make up in wisdom.

The four little creatures are:

1. Ants
2. Coneys (Hyrax)
3. Locusts
4. Lizards

LESSONS FROM THE ANTS

The word Ant occurs only twice in the Bible, in the familiar passages in Proverbs in both of which this insect is made an example of the wisdom of providing in the summer for the wants of the winter. Not all ants store up seeds for winter use, but among the ants of Palestine there are several species that do so, and their well-marked paths are often seen about Palestinian threshing-floors and in other places where seeds are to be obtained. The path sometimes extends for a great distance from the nest.

Studies has shown that Ants in northern Europe lie dormant in winter; and do not feed on grain, but flesh of other insects, worms, birds, the honeydew of aphides, and saccharine matter, exuding from trees. But in southern Europe there are species which feed on grain and store it for winter use. Agur son of Jakeh implies, the ant providently and diligently uses the proper seasons for

obtaining her food, though she has "no guide, overseer, or ruler," such as man has in parents, teachers, and masters; therefore laziness should be eliminated from man's life.

There is no monarch, such as the queen is among bees; but ants labor together as a republic, having "no ruler" as Agur son of Jakeh describes. Moggridge (Harvesting Ants) has by observation proved that there are four harvesting ants on the Riviera, namely, : Atta barbara, under two forms, the one wholly black, the other red headed; Atta structor, claret brown colored; and Atta megacephala or Pheidole, a minute bodied, yellow ant, with great head, which works chiefly at night. The Atta barbara, mounting the stem of a fruiting plant as shepherd's purse, and seizing a green pod in its jaws, and fixing its hind legs as a pivot, turns round and round and strains the fibers until they snap. Ants sometimes allow the capsules which they have cut to drop, and their companions below carry them away. Neither the Atta barbara nor the structor bring aphids into their nests.

A host of ants seek and bring in the grain; others sort the materials, strip off the useless envelopes of seed or grain, and carry them out to throw away. Moggridge found masses of seeds stored in chambers and long subcylindrical galleries prepared in the soil. The granaries on a rock covered with earth lay horizontally from one and a half to six inches below the surface. The ants have some mysterious power which checks germination. The few seeds which may germinate the ants prevent from further growth by cutting off the end of the radicle. Hebrew "ant," nemalah, is derived by some from Arabic for "clever." The Arabs put one in the new-born infant's hand, saying, "May he prove clever!" Others take it from namal, Hebrew "cut off," the body being cut into segments, joined by but a slight thread. Similarly in Prov. 30:25 the ants' wisdom is set forth as making up for the absence of the strength of larger creatures.

They belong to the family formicidae, and order Hymenoptera. The mutual affection between the members of the republic is conspicuous in ants. In northern Europe ants strike with their antennae and so make the aphids discharge the juice extracted by their suckers from vegetables; the ants in fact make the aphids their milk cows, imprisoning a number in their nests to serve as a supply in winter (Huber). Both the insect masters and the insect cows are torpid in winter in northern Europe; but in warm winters both at times come to life. The Indian ant (Atta, providens), according to Colossians Sykes, raises up heaps of grass seed in January when they ripen, in store for the season of need.

(For a long time, European commentators and naturalists denied that ants stored up grain for future use, as was asserted in Proverbs, but while this is true of most of the 104 European species, two of those species do lay up food, and are called harvesting ants. Like species have been found in Texas and South America, and are known to exist in Palestine. The soldier ants in Nigeria are harvesting ants.

They show many other proofs of their skill. Some of them build wonderful houses; these are often several stories high, sometimes five hundred times the height of the builders, with rooms, corridors, and vaulted roofs supported by pillars. Some species keep a kind of cows; others have a regular army of soldiers; some keep slaves -- "No closer imitation of the ways of man could be found in the entire animal economy." (See Encyclopedia Britannica.) McCook's "The Honey

Ants" gives many curious facts about the habits of this peculiar kind of ant, and of the harvesting ants of the American plains.

The amazing thing about the Ants is that they are hard workers and give no room for laziness. They are tomorrow thinkers who plan ahead so that they will not suffer in their future.

Prov 6:6-8

6 Go to the ant, you sluggard; consider its ways and be wise! 7 It has no commander, no overseer or ruler, 8 yet it stores its provisions in summer and gathers its food at harvest.
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Lessons from the Ants for man are as follows:

1. Wisdom is better than physical strength.

Ants were declared to be very wise by the scriptures. From their ability to mobilize themselves and make provision for the winter time without a leader, their wisdom is revealed. In their wisdom, they realized the ground is softer and easier to dig during the summer (raining season), and more difficult to gather food during the dry season or winter and snowing period. Because of the softness of the soil, they can access more food, build more houses and store rooms for food. Wisdom taught them to sleep less and work harder during summer so they can have a restful and peaceful winter.

The Bible teaches us that wisdom is the principal thing, and that we should do all that we can to get it and walk in it.

Prov 4:5-9

5 Get wisdom, get understanding; do not forget my words or swerve from them. 6 Do not forsake wisdom, and she will protect you; love her, and she will watch over you. 7 Wisdom is supreme; therefore get wisdom. Though it cost all you have, get understanding. 8 Esteem her, and she will exalt you; embrace her, and she will honor you. 9 She will set a garland of grace on your head and present you with a crown of splendor."

2. Foresight and planning are very important for survival and success.

The Ants are not only concerned about today, but about tomorrow. They are tomorrow thinkers. They have the foresight to plan for the winter by building storehouses and working harder to gather food for the summer and winter at the same time.

3 By wisdom a house is built, and through understanding it is established; 4 through knowledge its rooms are filled with rare and beautiful treasures.

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- If you get carried away by today and fail to look into tomorrow, you may find yourself in serious trouble.
- Failure to plan for tomorrow is invitation to crisis.
- Preparation for tomorrow is laying foundation for a successful tomorrow.
- If you fail to sow today, you will have nothing to reap tomorrow.
- If you don't sow the right seed in the season for sowing, you will reap confusion and sorrow tomorrow.
- If you allow laziness to take hold of you today, you will cry tomorrow when hunger starts biting hard.
- Plant seeds today for tomorrow. Sow physical seeds. Sow spiritual seeds. Sow favour into the lives of others. Sow financial seeds into the kingdom of God and into the lives of people. Don't eat all that God gives you, sow into your bank account for you don't know what tomorrow will bring.

3. Laziness brings poverty

It takes a hard working person to work twice his normal daily job to make provision for a future date. This is what the Ants do during the summer. In their wisdom, they realized the ground is softer and easier to dig during the summer (raining season), and more difficult to gather food during the dry season or winter and snowing period. Because of the softness of the soil, they can access more food, build more houses and store rooms for food. Wisdom taught them to sleep less and work harder during summer so they can have a restful and peaceful winter.

- There is a time to work and there is a time to rest.
- God is not lazy and does not encourage laziness, so, he instructs through Apostle Paul that anyone who will not work should not eat.

- There is no substitute to hard work in the school of success.

- The ants are not interested in leadership position. All they are thinking of is how to gather food for tomorrow. They are not proud, but hard workers.
- Pride blinds a man's eyes, and keeps him from seeing the work he has to do.
- God opposes the proud.

1 Peter 5:5-7

5 Young men, in the same way be submissive to those who are older. All of you, clothe yourselves with humility toward one another, because, "God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble." 6 Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that he may lift you up in due time. 7 Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you.

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6. There is power in cooperation.

The Ants teach us that there is power in team work. Working alone will not profit any ant. They can only make it together. A close observation of the soldier ants, reveal the ants form two parallel lines to protect the transporters of food to their storehouse. When the transporters get tired the ones on the lines will move in while the tired transporters will take their place on the line. Meanwhile, others are moving around scaring other creatures from coming near to disturb their work or attack them. Their success is as a result of working together as a team.

- Get people who agree with you, and work with them.

LESSONS FROM THE CONEYS (HYRAX)

The Coney in Hebrew is called shaphan. The Coney is “the hider”. It is an animal which inhabits the mountain gorges and the rocky districts of Arabia Petraea and the Holy Land. “The conies are but a feeble folk, yet make they their houses in the rocks” (Pro. 30:26; Psa. 104:18). They are gregarious (fond of company; sociable; living in flocks or colonies), and “exceeding wise” (Pro. 30:24), and are described as chewing the cud (Lev. 11:5; Deut. 14:7).

The animal intended by this name is known among naturalists as the Hyrax Syriacus. It is neither a ruminant nor a rodent, but is regarded as akin to the rhinoceros. When it is said to “chew the cud,” the Hebrew word so used does not necessarily imply the possession of a ruminant stomach. “The lawgiver speaks according to appearances; and no one can watch the constant motion of the little creature’s jaws, as it sits continually working its teeth, without recognizing the naturalness of the expression” (Tristram, Natural History of the Bible). It is about the size and colour of a rabbit, though clumsier in structure, and without a tail. Its feet are not formed for digging, and therefore it has its home not in burrows (a hole or tunnel dug by a small animal as a dwelling) but in the clefts of the rocks. “Coney” is an obsolete English word for “rabbit.”

A Coney is a rabbit, especially the common domesticated European rabbit.

Hyrax Small Mediterranean mammal: a small gregarious plant-eating mammal that resembles a rabbit with short ears and has toenails resembling hooves. Hyraxes live around the Mediterranean Sea and in southwestern Asia.

Crags: rocky part of mountain: a steep rough mass of rock forming part of a cliff or mountain peak. The Coney make their home in the crags.

Ps 104:18

8 The high mountains belong to the wild goats; the crags are a refuge for the coney.

5 The coney, though it chews the cud, does not have a split hoof; it is unclean for you

Isn't it amazing that a small creature like the Coney will choose to live not on a flat land or bushes, but in the crags - They choose the steep part of the mountain, the cliff or mountain peak. They live in the cracks and tiny spaces in between the rocks. They are thinking about the kind of places no other animal will be willing to come to because of fear of their safety. They know they are small and by makeup cannot fight predating animals, so they looked for the safest place they can dwell that predating animals will not want to risk their lives and come to. This kind of reasoning makes the scripture to declare them wise creatures.

Lessons from the Conies for man are as follows:

1. Your size (stature) is not important. What is important is your vision and faith.

- Where you come from does not matter.
- Your tribe, colour and language do not matter.
- Your family background does not matter.
- The vision of the conies is to make a home in the crags where they will be safe and no predator will want to come because of the danger of falling down and dying.
- How you think is more important than where and the family you come from.
- Faith in God and in yourself is essential for success to be attained.
